As an architectural historian at CRA, Chelsey's responsibilities include researching and documenting historic properties by conducting archival research and field surveys, evaluating the significance of historic properties, and preparing written reports that provide summary findings and recommendations.

Chelsey holds Master of Arts degrees in History and Appalachian Studies from Appalachian State University. Her graduate research focused on the material culture and vernacular architecture of Appalachia, as well as historic and contemporary folk traditions and foodways of the region.
